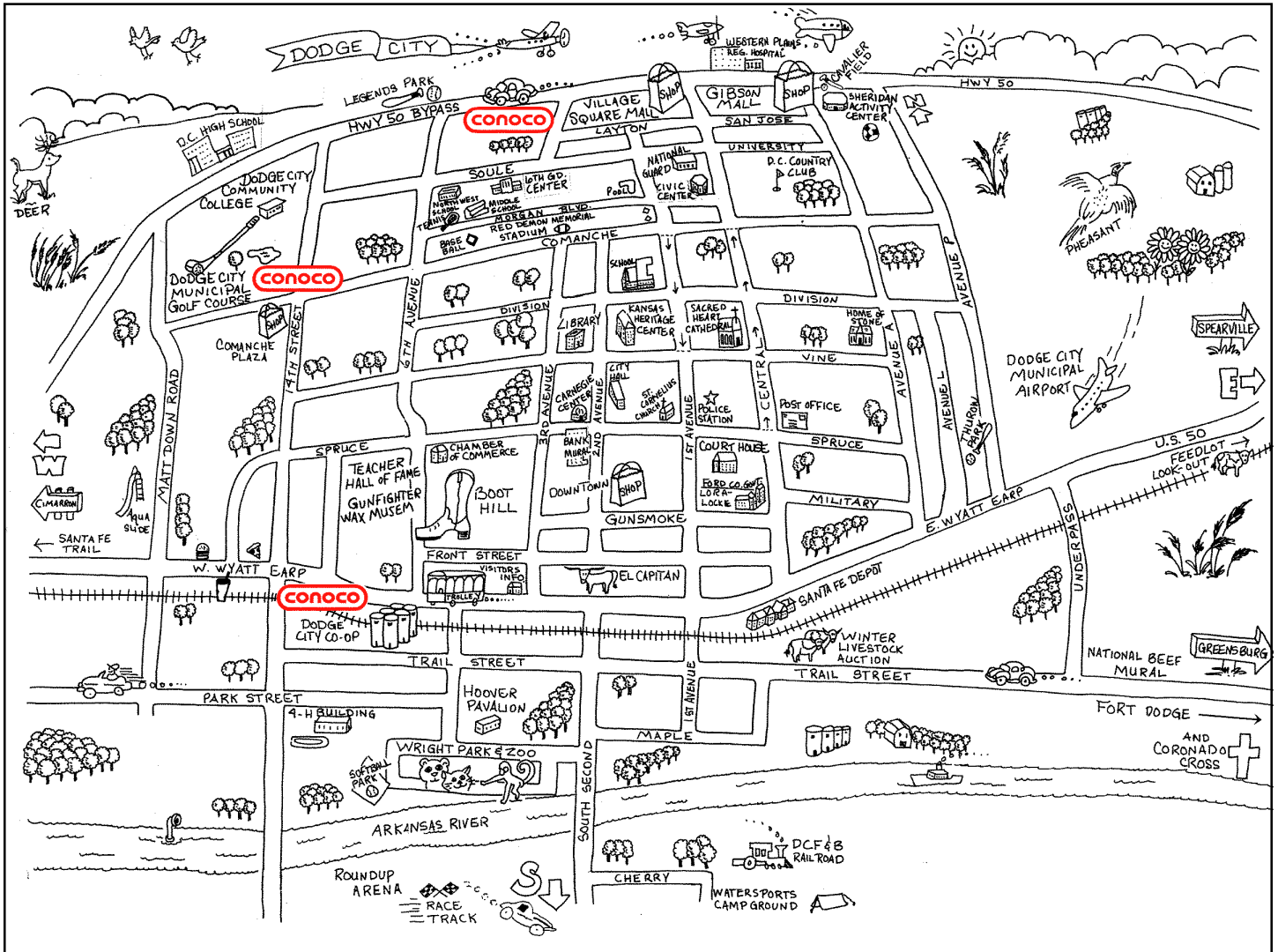


Visitors' Map of Dodge City

Local Attractions

Tourist Information

Visitors to Dodge City can obtain information at our Visitor Center located in front of the Boot Hill Museum parking lot, by calling 316-225-8186, or by visiting www.dodgecity.org. Information is also available on radio frequency 1610 AM.

Boot Hill Museum

Boot Hill Museum, located on Front Street, features information about Dodge City's beginning as the wildest town on the western frontier. Daily entertainment during the summer includes a medicine show, the Long Branch Variety Show, stagecoach rides, gunfights and, for special events, western chuckwagon dinners. Carnegie Center for the Arts

Carnegie Center for the Arts, 701 Second Avenue, served as the Dodge City Public Library from 1907 to 1970. The Center now operates as a gallery for traveling exhibits and local artists. For more information call 316-225-6388.

Dodge City Trolley Tours

Learn Dodge City's history and folklore on a narrated tour of sites where history was made. Visit original locations, tour Fort Dodge and ride the road bed of the Santa Fe Trail. Daily tours Memorial Weekend through Labor Day on an enclosed air-conditioned trolley. Group tours by reservations Sept. - May. For more information call 316-225-8186.

Coronado Cross

Coronado Cross is a 38-foot concrete cross commemorating what was considered to be the first Christian service west of the Mississippi. The mass was held in 1541 by Coronado's expedition. Coronado Cross and the park are located one and one-half miles east of Fort Dodge.

Cowboy Statue

This monument, located at Fourth and Spruce, was sculptured by O.H. Simpson, an early day pioneer dentist, to commemorate the cowboy and the cattle drives.

DCF&B Railroad

Turn back the clock as you board a train for a nostalgic 16 mile ride through the historic land of the "cowboys, indians and outlaws." The ride includes on-board entertainment. Snacks and gifts can be purchased on the combine car. Reservations are required for dinner service, offered Friday and Saturday nights during the summer. For rates call 316-225-3232.

St. Cornelius Episcopal Church

Built in 1898 using stone from the old Sturm Ice House, it is the oldest church building in Dodge City. Sunday School children earned money to purchase the large stained glass alter window. It is located on 'Gospel Hill' at 200 West Spruce.

El Capitan

Located at Second and Front Street, this bronze statue by Jasper D'Ambrosi commemorates the 1870s cattle drives from Texas to Dodge City.

Fort Dodge

Located five miles east of Dodge City on U.S. 154, Fort Dodge served as a supply depot and base of operation against the warring Indians from 1865-1882. It is now a Kansas Soldiers' Home. Museum/Library is open Monday-Saturday from 1-5 p.m. Admission is free.

Home of Stone

Home of Stone, 112 E. Vine, is the oldest house in Dodge City. With only two owners since 1881, it contains all original furnishings. The three-story home was built of two and one-half feet thick walls of limestone. The Home of Stone is open daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. during the summer. For more information call 316-227-6791.

Kansas Teachers' Hall of Fame

This memorial to the teachers of Kansas contains items from early day classrooms and educational activities. Located at 603 Fifth Avenue. Free admission. For hours and more information call 316-225-7311.

Sacred Heart Cathedral

This church, built in 1915-16 in the Spanish Renaissance style, is located at 903 Central Avenue. The Cathedral was placed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1982. Inside, visitors can view the Crucifixion mural behind the altar. For more information call 316-225-4802.

Santa Fe Trail

Santa Fe Trail was established to haul freight from Kansas City to the new settlement of Santa Fe in 1821. The Santa Fe Railroad began in 1872, thus ending the need for the Santa Fe Trail. The wagon tracks can still be seen at a historical marker ten miles west of Dodge City.

Scenic Overlook

Located one mile east of Dodge City on U.S. 50, visitors can see three typical feedyards with a combined capacity of approximately 50,000 head of cattle.

Stan Herd Murals

Located throughout the community are murals by nationally-acclaimed artist Stan Herd. The most prominent is a chronological historic mural on the Farmland-National Beef building on east Trail Street. A mural modeled from Frederick Remington's "The Old Stagecoach of the Plains" can be seen on the south side of the Bank of America building, downtown at Second & Spruce.

Kansas Heritage Center

Located at 1000 Second Avenue, the center is open Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The library contains the history of Kansas and the Old West, plus gifts and souvenirs.

Dodge City Zoo

Open daily in Wright Park except in inclement weather. Admission is free.
